'How about any one of the 150 days since the 19th BEC finished?' You may have a point there, but I have been busy unemployed, but very busy. For those of you who haven't given it a whirl yet, unemployment is a time consuming business. I've not just been sitting around idly you know there's been some amazing sport on the telly ... Bradley doing his thing in the Tour de France; Rafa & Roger doing their stuff at Rolland Garros and Wimbledon; Fernando, Javi, Cesc, Jesus (wow!), Juan, Sergio, Xavier and friends kicking about at Euro 2012; Mr Bean & Team GB on

their game at London 2012; Ernie mopping up after Adam at The Open; Andy coming good at the US Open ... and now Europe winning the Ryder Cup 14½ - 13½ in truly astonishing fashion there go three days for just the opening paragraph!

After eighteen years of tireless inner-tube lobbying by the BEC's Founder Member, the 19th BEC finally took place on the Kent Coast and featured some very fine courses. First Canterbury on the coldest, wettest April day for 500 years, then the very fine Princes and Cinque Ports courses (miraculously dry overhead and under foot), and finally the impressive Chart Hills in casual water and sunshine.

Reigning champion Martin Lee returned to defend his title (unencumbered this year by his former boss who had selflessly quit his job the day before to avoid further embarrassment on Tour) and Andy Slamin, another past Champion, rejoined the fray following absence (without a written note from his mother) in 2011.

As always, new precedents and records were set: participants signed in as guests at Canterbury GC by a friend and the friend's friends (see page 2); the BEC's first ever 'victory in absentia' (page 5) and a record Shortest Drive even shorter than Pete J's one inch drive at the 1st hole of Le Touquet La Foret back in 1998.

Classic gets underway at Canterbury

The 19th Bad Etiquette Classic got underway yesterday in miserable conditions at Canterbury Golf Club where unexpected early afternoon brightness gave way to an icy wind and driving rain for much of the late afternoon.

Out first, last year's champion Martin Lee appeared to be lacking form, partnering four-times champion Andy Slamin to a lackluster match half against Dave Grimbley and David Law. Lee failed to complete the first and last holes but demonstrated an understanding of the BEC's finer subtleties ahead of his years on tour, converting 4 pars and a birdie into earnings of £20 and the overnight yellow jersey. Slamin, a hot tip coming into this year's event, carded a miserable 92 for losses of £8 and will need to raise his game considerably around Kent's finest links if he is to achieve a record 5th title.

Only two other players managed modest positive earnings on this first day of play; Mark Powderham in 2nd place on £3 after a variable round which included his first chipin on tour in 19 years, and Pete lacobs in 3rd on £1 thanks largely to a sandy par net eagle at the 377yds 15th.

Players, spectators and the world's media will surely be hoping for better weather and a more exciting spectacle tomorrow when the 19th BEC cavalcade moves on to Princes Golf Club, Sandwich.

Guest appearance

In a first for the Bad Etiquette Classic, BEC participants were signed in at Canterbury GC as guests of Peter Biggs, Paul Jefferson, Simon Ellis and Bill Lloyd Hughes (all members of the club) for the very reasonable sum of £24 per head.

Tipped-off regarding the BEC's bizarre rules, the Canterbury Four chose to keep their stroke and distance and play their own 4-ball. In hindsight, this was a serious error of judgment as Stableford scores of 28, 32, 42 and 43 points (absurd in the conditions) would likely have translated into equivalent £ earnings.

Off to the King's Head

Following a right royal soaking at Canterbury GC and a very damp 17 mile drive to Deal, BEC participants were delighted to check into the warm and cosy Malvern Guesthouse.

But within minutes of doing so, bedrooms, bathrooms and the dining-room were commandeered as makeshift drying rooms for the urgent drying of clubs, bags, balls, umbrellas, shoes, clothing and inadequate water proofs.

Warm, clean and dry this year's BEC hopefuls left the hotel for the short walk to the long named King's Head and Channel View Guest House. And, totally unprepared for the gale force wind and horizontal rain that greeted them on the Deal sea front, they later took turns to stand and steam in front of the open fire at Dunkerley's Restaurant.

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Lee's lead lessened during Himalayan high drama

Conditions at Prince's Golf Club looked far from promising yesterday prior to the second day of the Bad Etiquette Classic. Rain fell incessantly, approach roads were flooded and security staff appeared to question the sanity of players as they arrived. However, following a 90 minute delay, conditions had improved sufficiently for play to get underway and for the patient gallery ('Robert' I think his name was) to be rewarded with some golfing action.

Peter Jacobs on the inward nine were remarkably trumped by 3 NE's from Dave Grimbley at 15, 16 and 18 to force the match half.

In the afternoon, there was drama from the start on Himalayas (highest peak 2.3m) when in front of the packed gallery (Robert now joined by 2 sherpas) Jacobs failed to get proceedings underway with an extraordinary air-shot on the 1st tee and then chipped in spectacularly for birdie at the 5th setting he

Out behind, as Dave Grimbley mourned the loss of a ball that had served him well for 37

holes, and Richard Reeves began an afternoon of ball and soul searching in the rough, Powderham and Slamin went head-to-head with the latter's 4, 4, 4 finish just enough to secure a Jup victory for himself and

partner Reeves.



In the morning 4-balls the quality of the golf mirrored the quality of the weather with some lack-luster ball striking around the front 9 (Shore) giving way to some splendid play on the back 9 (Dunes) as a cold wind

Mark Powderham and Andy Slamin doggedly defended a small lead in a tight match to defeat defending champion Lee and partner Malton 2&I whilst in the other match, 2 NE's from David Law's partner

and drizzle gave way to sunshine.

Inadequacies of a diarist

British Girl's Golf Champs (1956)

The full fury of the equinoctial gales roared unabated over the bleak vastness of the links.

In spite of the effect of the wind on her slimness, Miss Phillips was hitting the ball well and played many fine shots.

Some of the most convincing golf was that played by Miss Bisgood who, in spite of taking an impressive number of putts, beat Mrs Cook easily before lunch.

16th September - 625 moles killed to date; Staples planning early retirement in the Caribbean

Sublime Slamin ace sets pace at Royal Cinque Ports

As the Bad Etiquette Classic approaches the half way mark a tangible buzz of excitement is gripping residents across Deal (town motto 'Adjuvate Advenas' 'Befriend a Strangler'). No one from the

Deal Visitor Information Centre or Kent Golf Union was available for comment, but Ivor Gotya Littlebugger, President of the Deal & Walmer Cage Bird Society, said 'Bad vot? I no heard of it, but netted eagles rare, very rare!'

On day 3, participants took to the links of Royal Cinque Ports (also known locally as Deal Golf Club, The Golf Club, The Club and 'Over there'). And what a day it was. A day of remarkable shot-making: Slamin's hole-in-one at the 154yds 4th

and Lee's chip whilst straddling a dead rat

at the 2nd; a day of drama: Dave Grimbley catching his own ball in a greenside bunker at the 8th, and the club's artisans sent running for their lives by an errant Jacobs tee-shot at the 18th; and a day of controversy: the 1st hole PM won with an 8 after a little too much

Theakstons and some ill-feeling following under par sausages at the halfway house.

In the morning, Slamin's £12 NP, NE, CI, hole-in-one at the 4th stole the show and,

in combination with 6 further NB's and a second NE, led he and Jacobs to a comfortable 4&3 victory.

And in the afternoon, there were dramatic swings both on the course and on the leader board: Lee's dip hook from the tee at the 12th narrowly missed Jacobs' head as he stooped to retrieve a club from his bag, and Slamin followed his morning miracle at the 4th with a less miraculous FP blob at the same hole. Meanwhile, in their respective 4-balls, Malton

and Powderham were re-arranging the leader board with PM earnings of £27 and £14 respectively at the expense of Pete Jacobs, Dave Grimbley and David Law.

On £74 Slamin holds an almost unassailable lead ahead of Powderham on £22 and Lee on £14.

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Slamin victorious in absentia

In a quite extraordinary turn of events, Andy Slamin sealed a 5th Bad Etiquette Classic victory today despite failing to turn up for the final day of competition. Instead, the Tea Pot was secured from the comfort of his own living room while fellow participants battled for the lesser honours around the spectacular Chart Hills Golf Club. When notified of his 'victory in absentia' Slamin said 'Sitting on a £52 lead going into the final round I really couldn't be arsed and came home for a bit of R&R. I also got away without that daft bloody jacket and tea pot'.

Peter Biggs, who stood in for Slamin on the final day partnering Martin Lee to a hard-fought match half against Jacobs & Powderham commented after the match 'I don't think four NB's, an LD and an SD is bad for a GP, yet I'm the one who has to cough up £12 in what feels like a bad case of hemoptysis.'


And there were further respiratory complications in the 4-ball behind in which Reeves traumatised the opposition with 7 net birdies, a net eagle, 2 longest drives and a nearest pin on his way to a 5&4 victory and 18 hole earnings of £37, sending the opposition (Grimbley & Law) into dyspnea-inducing losses of £19 each.

Despite a £10 fine for failing to pitch up for the final round, Andy Slamin wins the 19th Bad Etiquette Classic with earnings of £64 some stroke and distance ahead of Lee in 2nd place on £27 and Powderham in 3rd on £23.
