There were other noteworthy appearances at the 29th BEC too. Richard back on the start list after a 4 year absence, and Pete defying the odds and medical science to compete just

three weeks after being admitted to hospital with concussion, broken ribs and a punctured lung.



David L & Steve vs Pete & Dave G

- Dave G opens with a magnificent LD at the first and sinks a crucial par putt at the 9th to keep himself and 'Girdled Pete' in contention
- Steve hits some enormous drives for show, but it's his partner David L bringing home the doe with 4 NBs and securing the match 2&I

Mark & Julian vs Geoff & Richard

- Richard runs riot on the front 9 with 2 NBs, 2 NPs and birdie net eagle at the 7th to take he and Geoff 5 up
- Mark & Julian 'stop the rot' at the 8th and somehow scramble the back 9 at the 18th

David L & Julian vs Mark & Steve

- Mark & Steve storm around the front 9 in just 3 over gross par better-ball to go 5 up
- It's a fabulous course and the weather gets better and better, but it's a tough day in the office for David & Julian who are crushed 7&6

Pete & Geoff vs Dave G & Richard

- Richard contributes little on the front 9 and it's thanks to Dave that they reach the turn 1 up and are still 1 up after 12
- At the 13th Richard awakens from his slumbers and wins all 6 of the remaining holes to secure the match 4&2 and pocket £20

Mark & Dave G vs Steve & Richard


• The golf's not great, but the match is a humdinger with the lead fluctuating back and forth. Mark wins the 6th and 7th holes and at the 8th Steve & Richard stare into the jaws of defeat as Steve settles over a 10ft putt to save the match. But hole it he does, and then adds insult to injury with a par 4 at the last to secure the match half.

David L & Geoff vs Julian & Pete

- There's not much to write home about as Julian & Pete slide to a 3&2 defeat with Geoff recording the only positive extras on the card with an LD at the 5th and an NB at the 6th
- Geoff and Pete regret their choice of shorts on a course with a prevalence of gorse

Negative Extras - An End to the Suffering

After 28 years of angst, anguish, and (occasional) argument, Shortest Drives (SDs) and Furthest from the Pins (FPs) were consigned to the scrapheap ahead of the 29th BEC. 222.5 Shortest Drives and 606 Furthest from the Pins (at a total cost of £2,475.50 to their contributors) banished to the annals of BEC history. SD, FP, RIP.



The course is both spectacular and immaculate and the sun shines for us once again.

Mark & Richard vs Steve & Geoff

- Steve & Geoff have it all their own way and reach the turn 6 up, but Richard's 5-iron to 18 inches for birdie NE at the 11th gives he & Mark renewed belief ... but nothing comes easy
- Richard hits a 273yds drive at the 15th but then loses his approach shot, and Mark 5 putts the 17th from the bottom of a 20ft high bank
- Steve & Geoff win the match 4&3, but Mark & Richard manage to salvage the back nine

Julian & Pete vs David L & Dave G

- Julian & Pete are 2 up after four, but Dave G unleashes a barrage of net birdies over the final 10 holes to win the match 5&3 and bag £27
- The pace of play is described as 'swift and purposeful' on account of Pete's taxi waiting to whisk him off to Knock for his early flight home

Handicaps - Time for Change

Since the BEC handicap system was introduced in 1999, changes have been made periodically to ensure its effectiveness. Ahead of the 29th BEC, the Founder Members once again deemed the system inadequate and sought to implement radical change. Out with all that totting-up of net scores shenanigans and in with a new earnings-based system imposing a 0.1 cut for every £2 won and a 0.1 increase for every £2 lost. Simples.

Set on The Mullet Peninsula, 80 miles west of Sligo, this is 'Golf at the End of the Earth'. There's some drizzle to begin with, but before too long we are playing in the sunshine.

David L & Richard vs Steve & Geoff

- David & Richard think they've won the front nine I up until they realise Steve had a shot in the match at the 6th and 8th and they have in fact lost the front nine I down
- Steve & Geoff prevail 2&I with seismic consequences for the leader board

Mark & Pete vs Julian & Dave G

- Mark starts strongly to put himself & Pete 4 up after 5
- Julian makes birdie 2 net eagle at the 7th and hauls himself & Dave back to just 2 down after 14, but from there the match slips away 4&2

Over lunch, we are joined by the Club Chairman who recounts the history of the club. The lights dim momentarily as he tells us that 'he feels a connection with the earth'.







Mark

Playing little golf and saddled with (in his view) a ridiculous BEC handicap of 14, Mark approached

the 29th BEC with modest expectations. But after a poor opening round, he played better than expected at County Sligo and Carne elevating him to an unlikely 2nd place where he ultimately finished. Entirely dependent on fellow players to watch and find his ball, Mark looks forward (literally) to playing BEC30 with improved vision following a scheduled cataract op.

thought that Pete would make it. His doctors gave him no chance at all, but Pete the Determined was ruling nothing out. 'I won't be allowed to fly so looking at ferry options' (26 July); 'Perhaps I'll just bring 7-iron, wedge & putter' (28 July); 'Doctors still saying 6 weeks' (8 Aug); 'Played 8 holes today with no ill effects; assume I'm in' (12 Aug). And sure enough Pete made it to Ireland. Okay, with a limited swing he didn't play that well, lost 4 of 5 matches, parted with £50 and came last, but most importantly his 100% Tour attendance record was maintained. 

From there (also not for the first time) he slipped out of contention to finish 7th with losses of £26 causing some to question whether negative extras (abolished this year) were not after all the principal cause of David's year -on-year woes. A big thanks to David for his unswerving efforts over 500 miles at the wheel.



Richard

Back after an absence of four years, no one knew quite what to expect from saved his best until last, recording 5 net birdies, and a net eagle at Enniscrone on his way to a 5&3 match win and an 8th Scarisbrick title. Final round earnings of £27 catapulted Dave up into 5th place on £5, his second finish 'in the black' in 27 starts. Congratulations Dave.



Geoff

Defeat at County Sligo with losses of £16 presented an unexpected and unwelcome setback for the

reigning BEC Champion. From there, 3 hard-fought match wins just about kept Geoff in the running, but ultimately a lack of net birdies and positive extras thwarted his attempts to ascend the leader board and mount a serious defence of his title and the Tea Pot.

Steve

Despite not having played on the Tour proper since 1999, second place in the 2018 BEC Prologue had served notice (if notice were required) that Steve might be a contender at the 29th Bad Etiquette Classic. And, frankly, from the outset there was to be no stopping him. Third after the opening round at Strandhill and established in the Yellow Cashmere on £35 by Sunday evening, the writing was on the wall. Only Richard in second place on £32 had any chance of stopping him. But that chance was short-lived and emphatically snuffed out at Carne where Steve & Geoff beat David L & Richard 2&I contributing to a £32 swing that put Steve out in front and out of reach. The final round at Enniscrone was little more than a procession as Steve notched up a comfortable 4&3 match win to remain unbeaten and secured the Tea Pot with earnings of £56. Congratulations Steve!

Finally, a big thanks to Steve for keeping the wheels on the bus going round and round.













BEC29's Longest Drives

ur itinerary this year was nothing short of insane. First we had to get to Dublin. 'No problem sir. How about the 8 of you fly from 5 different UK mainland airports on flights so early that you're each up just after dawn?' Perfect. Thank you. Then, after our 300 mile flights, we needed to drive 135 miles to Sligo. 'No problem again sir. Can I recommend one car and one bus for the 3 hour journey getting you to Strandhill at least 10 minutes before your scheduled tee time?' Super. Yes. Wise counsel indeed.

So, off we set with David L driving the car and Steve driving the bus with our journey to Sligo taking us past Ballinalack (always a risk if you don't keep your head down), Ballinamuck (can be cleaned without penalty under rule 14.1), Strokestown ('Pete appears to have slowed his Strokestown'), Ballinafad (a ball moving from left to right) and Sli Monear (quite possible after a recovery shot from Ballinamuck).
